# **Exploring Literature and Language with Instruments**

#### Extensions on the Lesson

# After watching the video and/or reading the story *Max Found Two Sticks*, here are some ideas to extend the lesson further:

- Find other objects students can play with their sticks, at home or in the classroom (e.g. floor, table, door, cooking pot). Remind them to be careful when pretending an object is a drum. Encourage them to describe what is different about the objects. What are they made of? Are they hard to play? What sounds do they make? Do they sound like any of the instruments Max plays?
- Create new words or phrases to play, based on vocabulary that students are learning (e.g. numbers, colors, names of animals). Perform Max Found Two Sticks again—with the same instruments and objects—but have the sticks play the new vocabulary.
- Identify books with repetitive phrases and play the phrases with the sticks, using the floor or a found object or an instrument as the "drum."
- Find a book that sequences a series of animals or objects, each with its own sound (see the following bibliography). For example, *Rattletrap Car* sequences car parts, and *The Little Old Lady Who Was Not Afraid of Anything* sequences articles of clothing. Instead of using sticks, use the objects from the story to play the rhythms.

## **Other Resources**
